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### Introduction

M.A. in Sanskrit is of 80 credits spread over four semesters. This programme emphasizes core/compulsory courses, Dual Specialization (Literature & Grammar) as Electives, Open Electives. There will be continuous internal Examinations/assessments conducted by the Department with End Semester Examinations.

There will be 20 Credits and divided into five papers with four credits each for each Semester for a total of 80 Credits in four semesters.

## Structure of the courses

There are 14 core/compulsory,4 Elective and 2 Open Elective courses offered by the Department. The Compulsory courses are offered in all the semesters as 5:5:2:2 ratio. The courses also include one paper in the compulsory section at 4<sup>th</sup>Semester as Project Work.The Elective courses are offered in 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Semesters as 2:2 respectively and the Open elective courses are also offered in 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Semesters as 1:1.

### Specialization/Elective

As of now, the Department of Sanskrit is offering two Specializations Literature and Grammar in 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Semesters as Elective papers respectively. The Student(s)has/have to choose one specialization of his/her choose one among the two specializations in 3<sup>rd</sup> Semester which will be continued in 4<sup>th</sup> Semester also.

### **Open Elective**

There are some courses namely Open Courses/Electives in (3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> semester) from which the student can opt those papers from the parent Department or from other Department (subject to offering of concerned Department). Similarly Students of other Departments can also avail the Open Elective courses.

#### Writing the Answer

The answer in the Examinations (Mid semester Examinations and End Semester Examinations) should be written in Sanskrit(in Devanagari script) or in English, if otherwise specified.

Each paper carries 100 Marks i.e.; 60 Marks for the End Semester Examination and 40 marks for the mid-term examinations. Each Unit of the End-Semester Examination will carry 12 Marks.
